

# Courage, Respect, & Wisdom Retreats Coming This Fall

In an effort to ensure an environment where students work together and support one another at Spectrum, we are excited to provide an opportunity for our 7th, 9th, and 12th grade students to participate in a one-day character retreat presented by the Youth Frontiers organization. The Youth Frontiers Courage Retreat (7th grade), which happens on October 10, inspires character by energizing an entire grade level of students to act with moral courage and identify the social fears that impede responsible decision-making. The retreat encourages them to take positive risks that make a healthy difference for themselves, their peers, and school.

The Youth Frontiers Respect Retreat (9th grade), which happens on October 16, inspires character by encouraging students to respect themselves more, to respect others, and to stand up for respect in their school. The retreat reminds students that they matter, and that there is a supportive community of educators, mentors, and classmates around them.

The Youth Frontiers Wisdom Retreat (12th grade), which happens on January 22, gives seniors healthy closure to their high school years and inspires them to finish the school year in a respectful and caring manner. The retreat provides seniors a chance to reflect and share memories as an entire class. Students gain critical perspective on their high school experiences so they can move forward with wisdom and character.

Spectrum has planned for a variety of follow-up activities on campus that will help to extend the “mountain top” experience of the retreats into the daily routines here at Spectrum.

## Online Safety for SPECTRUM STUDENTS

Spectrum is committed to providing a safe online experience for our students. All Spectrum devices have website filtering through a company called Securly. The Securly filter is a cloud-based filter that works on all student computers and devices. It also works on Chromebooks when they are taken home. Securly has introduced a parent app that will be rolled out soon. The app will allow parents to see their student's online activity in real-time. In addition, parents of high school students with a take home device will be able to adjust their student's access to content when the device is at home. Spectrum recognizes the value of keeping parents in-the-know so we can partner together in educating students.

# WHAT'S NEW IN

## SERVICE LEARNING IN 2018-19

Service learning classes have been redesigned to increase consistency for students, expose students to more service learning opportunities, and build toward a more personalized culminating Senior Capstone project.

After research, analysis, and discussion last school year, changes were made to the Service Learning Program for the 2018-2019 school year.

Service learning classes have been redesigned to increase consistency for students, expose students to more service learning opportunities, and build toward a more personalized culminating Senior Capstone project.

Students in grades 6 through 9 will now experience a different service learning opportunity each quarter. Each of the service learning quarterly classes will allow students a chance to research a specific area of service, participate in a service action (*which could include a field trip, a special event on campus, or an outside guest*), and finally reflect on their service learning experience.

Students in grades 10 through 12 will work at various stages of their senior capstone project in their service learning classes. Students in grade 10 will explore the concepts and practice the skills necessary for successful completion of their senior capstone project. By the end of the year, students will have decided on a direction for their senior project. Students in grade 11 will receive support as they independently implement their project. Seniors will complete the finishing touches on their project, present their project, and complete a

thorough reflection paper in their first semester. For the remainder of their senior year, service learning classes will focus on how they can call others to action regarding philanthropic efforts in the area of their particular interest and passion.

The table below outlines the service learning class opportunities in more detail.

An additional component of our program is the completion of independent community service hours outside of school. The suggested number of hours is 3 hours per quarter for middle level students and 5 hours per quarter for high school students. To facilitate a more authentic independent service experience, we will be placing an increased focus on individual service reflections. Reflections will be evaluated by the student's service learning teacher and will be included as part of their service learning grade. Students will not be required to turn in signatures for completion of service. Instead, they will track service hours and complete their reflections in their eBinder.

The hope is that by providing opportunities for involvement in a variety of service experiences, and focusing on personal reflection and independent action, our students will gain an understanding of community needs, philanthropy, and their role and connection to their community.

## Spectrum High School Principal Corner

Parents,

Have you asked your student about Sting Time yet? Well, if not, that's alright because here's a quick overview. Sting Time is a 28 minute chunk of time that occurs each day Spectrum runs our block schedule. In an average week, this means students would have Sting Time a total of four times (Tuesday - Friday). These four days are broken up into three categories.



First, is our Sting Time Advisory period, which usually occurs on Tuesdays. During this period students meet with an assigned teacher advisor. The focus during this time ranges from helping students stay organized, to checking and staying up to date on grades, to working through our focused notes process. During Sting Time Advisory students are able to view the school's newcast, "Noise News" and they also find out where, and with who, the remainder of their Sting Time week will be spent.

Next on our list is Sting Time RTI, which usually occurs Wednesdays and Thursdays each week. These two days represent opportunities for teachers to create their own roster of students allowing them to target individual and group learning needs. Teachers work on standards students have not yet mastered, extensions of lessons recently delivered in class, as well as enrichment lessons that are dedicated to going deeper into content than what the typical classroom environment allows.

Lastly, is our Sting Time Clubs/Groups/RTIS day. Typically occurring on Friday, students recently opted to either be part of a unique club/group or have chosen to take part in RTIS day. RTIS is simply an extension of the RTI model mentioned above. The only difference is that students are now selecting teachers that they need specific help from in a class. It truly allows our students the opportunity to take responsibility for their own learning while promoting self-advocacy skills.

So, next time you're discussing school with your child, go ahead and ask them, "Can you please tell me a little bit about Sting Time"?



## Spectrum Middle School Principal Corner

This year marks many “Firsts” for Spectrum Middle School: alternating block schedule for all three grades, a new 7-8th grade site, (soon) a new physical education field, and time during the school day for some small group and individualized attention.



Each Wednesday - Friday from 1:03 to 1:31, students work with their teachers to ensure that learning is happening. At the 7-8th site, teachers select students each week on Mondays, based on needing to take or re-take a quiz or test, a re-teach on a concept, or a question that needs more explanation. As the process becomes familiar, this time will be open for students to work on their self-advocacy, going to teachers themselves. We are hoping to open the time for potential clubs, team building activities, and other meetings, like a Student Advisory Crew (team), along with other enrichment opportunities.

At the 6th grade building, these extra minutes are set aside to learn about our district’s AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) strategies and to boost students in areas they need as a foundation for middle school. If we find that students have that strong foundation, other enrichment opportunities are offered, like robotics and a student-run newspaper.

Exciting Firsts are happening at Spectrum Middle, and Sting Time is playing a big part in that excitement! Feel free to reach out, or to visit to see it in action and be sure to ask your child questions about it. Our door is always open, making Spectrum Middle a great place to learn!

As part of the solution, we are enabling access for parents to the free SecurlyHOME app and Parent Portal view. Within the next week, you will receive a welcome email from Securly with a link to download SecurlyHOME (remember to check your spam/junk folder). Once you download the app, you'll start to receive weekly email reports with samples of your child's online activity over the previous week.






- Once you've clicked the link, you'll be taken into the SecurlyHOME App. Your account is ready to go! You'll start receiving weekly email updates about your child's online activity.







Scans social media and web searches and flags posts that indicate bullying, self-harm or suicide. Websites encouraging self-harm are also flagged.
